


CRUMP EXPRESSWAY

~ a column from our Minister, The Reverend Steve J. Crump

We vote on Sunday, December 9 at 12:45 pm. We vote on the question to ordain Nathan Ryan, our assistant minister, into the Unitarian Universalist ministry. Assuming a positive vote, an ordination (to be scheduled in 2013) will be historic for this church—the first time in our history we've ordained a minister. Only a congregation can ordain in our religious tradition. Please attend the congregational meeting.

Consider this geometric depiction about which I spoke this fall. (See illustration below designed by church member **Don Hoppe**.)



ARK? What does it mean? I first read of this creative way of explaining how attitudes change in Sacred Ground: Pluralism, Prejudice, and the Promise of America by Eboo Patel. (Patel is next year's UUA Ware Lecturer at the General Assembly in Louisville in June.) Patel, founder and director of Interfaith Youth Core, explains that we can bombard our opponents with books and pamphlets and facts, but the real change of attitude occurs in face-to-face relationships. For example, when a co-worker or neighbor of yours learns that you are a Unitarian Universalist, the very context of her/his appreciating your loyalty and character as a co-worker or neighbor brings respect to the other aspects of you, your religious affiliation, for example. The UU church now becomes more than an abstraction for the person who knows you and calls you by name.

We can read literature on Islam or the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints – anyone can do that - but until we meet someone for conversation, calling each other by name, perhaps sharing a meal or ritual, our attitudes are likely to change very little. At church we invited Muslims after 9/11, and, in August, invited Sikhs, Nikki and Gurcharan, after the murderous rampage at the Gurdwara in Oak Creek, WI. Then, we invited two Mormons, **David** and **Deric**, who appeared in a pulpit-dialogue here in September. Facts can be found on a website or a reliable book on world religions. But in community, knowledge is incomplete without the face-to-face encounter. Have you experienced the action of ARK, attitude, knowledge, and relationship, working in positive ways in your life? Historians, political scientists, and sociologists often describe the inner workings of ARK as they describe the assimilation process of our nation, the blending and mixing of others from other continents into one nation. This nation is not a melting pot. We are a gumbo. where particular ingredients are identifiable and good. May faceto-face interaction continue to operate in our lives. This church would be meaningless without it. ARK is key to personal, spiritual, and transformational change. I call it *creative interchange*. Some would call it God. See you in church in December.

Assistant Minister's Column

"It's not dark because it's Christmas. It's Christmas because it's dark." This sage observation from a ministerial mentor of mine still rings true. Christmas time can be challenging for many people. This is the time when many remember those who used to be here, days long past, and reflect on our own lives. These are the darkest days of the year. It's no coincidence that we cope with the lack of sunlight by hanging lights on our porches and trees or by placing candles in our windows.

Just as we try to find ways to bring light into our homes, the church is here to bring light into your life (and it has been doing so since its founding more than 60 years ago). We have loving volunteers who are available to be with you in your darker times. We send cards to those in ill health, who lost a loved one, or had major life transitions. We can provide food and assistance when needed. Every Sunday the Listening Room (located in the hallway just off of the fellowship hall) is staffed by a Pastoral Care Associate. They are there to listen when you need to talk. Please note, while this may be therapeutic, it is not therapy, and the Associates do not perform counseling. They simply listen. The combined efforts of the Congregational Care Committee (CCC) and the Pastoral Care Associates (PCAs) help build a world we want to live in – a world of love and caring.

My Christmas hope is that you let us know what is going on in your life. Please call or email me to tell me when you are going to have surgery, when a family member is sick, or you just need to talk. Only through asking can we build a stronger community.

The Meaning of Ordination: Only a congregation in our tradition can ordain. Ordination is often called the highest demonstration of power that any standing congregation can exhibit. Our Board is asking the congregation on December 9 to vote to ordain Nathan Ryan. Having completed seminary and now credentialed by the UUA Ministerial Fellowship Committee, Nathan could have asked any UU congregation to ordain him; however, he is asking us to ordain him, bestowing the title of *The Reverend* as part of his name, enabling him to participate fully in the rights and privileges of ordained clergy in this church, in Baton Rouge, and in society at large. Ordination is an empowering action on the part of any UU congregation. It is a ritual action with historically deep roots in the Unitarian Universalist tradition. Assuming a positive vote by the congregation on 12/9, we will plan an ordination ceremony for a Sunday evening in the new year.

And another year is coming to an end, but not until we have experienced 2012 Holiday Season. Our month of celebration includes some beautiful music for our Sunday services and special events.

Our Capital Growth Campaign is well underway, and we are in sight of achieving the goals of our Strategic Growth Plan. As a reminder, those goals include:

A Safe and Accessible Campus and Memorial Area: Our Parking Lot. Our church campus will be more welcoming with a new and redesigned parking lot with marked spaces and new landscaping. Well-lighted areas will ensure safety and security at night. Our meadow, with the Peace Stones as a central focus, will create a beautiful and respectful setting for memorial services and meditation.

A More Sacred and Accessible Space to Gather in Diverse Worship: Our Sanctuary. Our long-time dreams of a raised chancel will allow greater visibility from any place in the sanctuary. Children in multi generational worship will be better able to see the minister and others participating in worship services and other occasions. New theater lighting, a state-of-the-art audio system, built-in projector equipment, and new carpeting will result in an aesthetically inviting environment for children and adults alike. And yes, we can look forward to a reduction of that pesky glare from our land-mark circle window!

Increased Capacity for a Growing Membership and Ministry: Expanded Staffing: Our over-loaded professional and volunteer staff is already realizing the benefits of having an Assistant Minister. However, only two years of funding for the Assistant Minister's position is currently available, so permanent funding is needed in order to increase the potential of advancing our goals of social justice, programming, and greater presence in the larger community. Additionally, several other positions are needed to help with administrative and technical functions to support professional staff. Additions to administrative space are also needed.

The goals of our "Great Expectations" Capital Growth Campaign evolved from the hopes and dreams for what our growing church could be, articulated by members who gathered in Cottage Meetings held in members' homes more than three years ago. Their achievement will be joyously shared by all who make generous and sacrificial pledges to our Capital Growth Campaign. If you have not already done so, join others who have pledged to make dreams for the continued and future growth of our church a reality.
